#### **Admissions Needs**

- I. Application
- 2. Official Transcripts (may be emailed directly by the academy)
  - a) Early Acceptance after 6 semesters with a 2.75 GPA or higher
- 3. ACT or SAT scores accepted, but not required for Fall 24
- 4. Juniors receive early acceptance after 5 semesters with a GPA of 3.0 or higher



#### **Regular Admissions Criteria**

- I. HS graduation with GPA on transcript of 2.75 or higher
- 2. GPA's under 2.75 will be reviewed and the decision is based on selective A-G GPA and courses passed in the following areas.

#### Subject (a-h) requirements (15)

- 4 years of English
- 3 years of Math
- 2 years of laboratory Science
- 2 years of History
- 2 years of Foreign Language
- I year of Fine Arts
- Electives
- \* Religion can be counted towards GPA from SDA schools



#### **Provisional Admissions\***

- I. If GPA is below 2.75
- 2. Selective A-G GPA is calculated
- 3. Course passes in A-G courses is calculated (C or better)

If minimum standards for regular admission are not met, those just below the threshold may be offered provisional admission

Once final grades are in, GPA and courses will be recalculated for possible regular admission

\*If a student is close to meeting provisional criteria, we will defer our decision until senior grades are available.



#### International Admissions Criteria

- I. Application
- 2. Transcripts or appropriate HS completion (examination results). GCEO, CXC, etc.
- 3. English Test Scores not required if in a US school for a year or more.
- 4. ACT or SAT scores are currently waived for Fall 24. If not graduating from a US school then tests such as TOEFL, IELTS, MTELP or iTEP may be required. Duo Lingo is now an acceptable English proficiency application.

#### **Admissions Needs**

- I. Application
- 2. Transcripts
  - I. Early Admission 2.75 GPA + on 6 semesters
  - 2. Regular Admission 2.5 GPA+ on 7 semesters
- SAT/ACT Scores (required for admission for students to be admitted on probation)



#### **Regular Admissions Criteria**

- HS graduation with an unweighted core GPA of at least 2.5 in the following required subject areas:
  - 4 years of English
  - 2 years of Mathematics (including Algebra 1)
  - 2 years of Science
  - 2 years of History
- GED standard score of at least 165 on each of the four tests and an average standard score of 177 for all four tests.
- CHSPE passing score along with: completion of two years of secondary school; personal interview with student and parents; student letter explaining reasons for wanting to begin college early; and letter of recommendation from faculty member of the most recent secondary school, including evaluation of student's social and academic readiness for college.



#### **Probation Admissions Criteria**

- HS Graduation with an unweighted core GPA of 2.0-2.49 in the following required courses:
  - I. 4 years of English
  - 2. 2 years of Mathematics (including Algebra 1)
  - 3. 2 years of Science
  - 4. 2 years of History
- 2. SAT or ACT test score required



#### International Admissions Criteria

- Application
- Transcripts
- Letter of Recommendation
- English level exam score
  - TOEFL, SAT, ACT, IELTS, PTE, MELAB, iTEP
- Documentation of financial plan including a bank statement showing at least \$51,264 USD on deposit in an international bank
- Deposit of \$1,000 USD in PUC student account, which will remain on deposit until the student ceases to attend PUC or chooses to apply it to the final quarter\*
- Enrollment Fee of \$200 USD\*

\*Must be completed before an I-20 will be issued

#### AEA – History

Established in 1998/1999 to developing cross territory recruitment policies & college fairs

Made up of all 13 SDA colleges/universities in North America.

1999 – College Fairs began

2004 – Joint Marketing Committee formed

2005 – Joint marketing began

2006 – Established evening fairs

2008 – Adventist Choice common app

#### AEA -Policies

Colleges/universities sponsored by a local union have unlimited access to academies located within the sponsoring union, within the limits established by the local union conference offices of education or academies.

No limits are placed on the number of print or electronic communications (mail, calls, emails) that may be made to the students from colleges/universities.

A representative of the AEA will organize the dates for the NAD fairs and distribute the information to all academics and colleges/universities

#### AEA -Policies

The health science colleges and universities (Adventist Health University, Kettering College and Loma Linda University) are encouraged to join the scheduled college fairs. If they are unable to do so because of staffing challenges, they may conduct an academy visit separate from the college fair with permission of the academy.

Adventist colleges/universities located outside of the NAD may recruit in the division by invitation from AEA with the understanding that schools in their territories can receive reciprocal visits.

### **AEA - POLICIES**

- Scholarships from out-of- territory colleges/universities may be announced at academy graduations by academy personnel, at the discretion of the academy principal.
  - The one exception is Oakwood University, whose staff traditionally has appeared, with permission, at the graduations across the NAD representing the denomination's only historically black college.
  - It is understood that the student receiving the award has applied and been accepted to the same school awarding the scholarship (this applies to Oakwood).
  - No such limits are placed on the colleges within their own unions.

### **AEA - POLICIES**

 Requests by academies for non-recruitment programs (Weeks of Prayer, Sabbath and Vespers speakers, or performances by music, gym, or drama groups) are acceptable. It is understood that these visits are not to include overt recruitment activities.
